Make Time for Play: October Events at The Armory A 10th Anniversary Open House Celebration; Partnerships with Oregon Nikkei Legacy; a Showcase of Plays by Residents of Affordable Housing; and Classes Taught by Matthew B. Zrebski, Laura Faye Smith and Courtenay Hameister



September 22, 2016 – PORTLAND, OR. October marks Portland Center Stage's 10th anniversary in The Armory, the historic building that was constructed 125 years ago and opened its doors in 2006 as the country's first building on the National Register of Historic Places, and the first performing arts venue, to achieve a LEED Platinum rating. To celebrate the occasion, an open house on October 2 will include live music, backstage tours, and a retrospective display of costumes and production photos. Volunteers will also be on hand to help visitors register to vote (#PlayOurPart).

Other October events include a happy hour with *Hold These Truths* playwright Jeanne Sakata and the Oregon Nikkei Legacy Center; a First Thursday event featuring a performance by Mic Crenshaw and a meet and greet with members of the *Little Shop* creative team; *Vision & Vigilance*, a dramatic reading and civil rights discussion; Portland Poetry Slams; post-show Perspectives Series for *Hold These Truths; We Are Visible*, a short-play showcase benefiting The Giving Tree; and adult classes on playwriting, improv and memoir writing.

Portland Center Stage at The Armory

Portland Center Stage at The Armory is the largest theater company in Portland and among the top 20 regional theaters in the country. Established in 1988 as a branch of the Oregon Shakespeare Festival, the company became independent in 1994 and has been under the leadership of Artistic Director Chris Coleman since May, 2000. An estimated 150,000 people visit The Armory annually to enjoy a mix of classical, contemporary and world premiere productions, along with a variety of high quality education and community programs. Eleven productions are offered each season, in addition to roughly 400 community events created — in partnership with 170+ local organizations and individuals — to serve the diverse populations in the city. As part of its dedication to new play development, the company has produced 20 world premieres and presents an annual new works festival, JAW: A Playwrights Festival. The Northwest Stories series was recently launched to develop and produce works about, or by artists from, the Northwest region. Home to two theaters, The Armory was the first building on the National Register of Historic Places, and the first performing arts venue, to achieve a LEED Platinum rating.
