



January 29, 2014 – PORTLAND, ORE., Bo-Nita, the hilarious and heartbreaking story that was developed at PCS's 2012 JAW: A Playwrights Festival, begins preview performance on February 1, opens on February 7 and runs through March 16 in the Ellyn Bye Studio. In partnership with the YWCA of Greater Portland and the Oregon Psychoanalytic Center, social justice activists, counselors, therapists and social workers will lend their expertise and personal responses to Bo-Nita as part of PCS's Perspectives and Formative Stages series.

These ongoing series are always free and open to the public. In

addition, a solo playwriting workshop will be offered for those inspired by this one-woman show.

Life's not easy for Bo-Nita. It never is for a 13-year-old, but especially one who winds up with a dead, semi-ex-stepfather on her bedroom floor. With humor, pathos and a dash of Midwest magical realism, Bo-Nita follows a mother and daughter's journey through a working-class America of dwindling resources, and the lengths they must go to stay together and keep their beat alive. Bo-Nita is a storytelling piece in the vein of The Moth, This American Life and Portland's own Back Fence PDX. In this one-woman show, Kate Eastwood Norris takes on the role of Bo-Nita, along with six other characters, to bring this story to life. Bo-Nita marks Gretchen Corbett's PCS directorial debut.

<u>PORTLAND CENTER STAGE</u> inspires our community by bringing stories to life in unexpected ways. Established in 1988 as a branch of the Oregon Shakespeare Festival, PCS became an independent theater in 1994 and has been under the leadership of Artistic Director Chris Coleman since May 2000. The company presents a blend of classic, contemporary and original productions in a conscious effort to appeal to the eclectic palate of theatergoers in Portland. PCS also offers a variety of education and outreach programs for curious minds from six to 106, including discussions, classes, workshops and partnerships with organizations throughout the Portland metro area.

Portland Center Stage's 2013-2014 season is funded in part by Season Superstars Tim & Mary Boyle and Lead Corporate Champion Umpqua Bank; Season Sponsors the Paul G. Allen Family Foundation, Oregon Arts Commission and the National Endowment for the Arts, the Regional Arts & Culture Council and Work for Art; and Season Supporting Sponsors KINK FM and Oregonian Media Group. The Mark Spencer Hotel is the official hotel partner for Portland Center Stage.

THE GERDING THEATER AT THE ARMORY houses the 590-seat Main Stage and the 190-seat black box Ellyn Bye Studio. It was the first building on the National Register of Historic Places, and the first performing arts venue, to achieve a LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) Platinum certification. The Gerding Theater at the Armory opened to the public on Oct. 1, 2006. The capital campaign to fund the renovation of this hub for community artistic activity continues.

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
